Dunalley Primary School Improvement Plan – Reading

We have recently finished and submitted our co-constructed School Improvement Plan for Dunalley Primary School. A School Improvement Plan is essential because it operationalises our long-term strategic goals into actionable steps for the coming year. It allows us to:

- 1. Set clear, measurable objectives
- 2. Allocate resources efficiently
- 3. Monitor progress regularly
- 4. Adapt to new challenges and opportunities.

Reading targets are particularly crucial in primary education. They help us:

- Ensure all students make expected progress (eg 12 months growth annually)
- Increase the number of students performing in top achievement bands
- Identify and support students falling behind through universal screening and intervention.





Priority 1 Reading Focus Area:

Implement explicit teaching of word recognition and fluency.

Target 1

75% of students deemed 'at risk' or 'some risk' of not meeting the DIBELS LNF will improve their results by the end of 2025.

"By the end of 2025, we expect to see improvement in 3 out of 4 students who are currently struggling with a specific reading skill."

Let's break this down further:

What does this mean?

- DIBELS is a test used to check early reading skills in young children.
- LNF stands for 'Letter Naming Fluency," which measures how quickly and accurately a child can name letters.
- "At risk" or "some risk" means these students are having difficulty with this skill.
- The goal is to help 75% (which is 3 out of every 4) of these struggling students do better on this test by the end of 2025.

Why is this important?

- Identifying letters quickly is a fundamental skill for learning to read.
- Improving this skill can help students become better readers overall.
- Setting this goal shows that our school is committed to helping students who are falling behind in reading.

In simpler terms, the statement is saying: "We want to help our struggling young readers get better at naming letters quickly by the end of the year."

Target 2

Maintain PAT Reading Growth P-6 at 'met low' and 'above' at 78% for 2025.

What does this mean?

This statement is about a reading test and a goal for student performance. Let's break it down:

- PAT Reading: This stands for "Progressive Achievement Test" in Reading.
- 2. P-6: This refers to students from Prep (or Foundation) to Year 6.
- 3. "Met low" and "above": These are categories of student progress. Students who "met low" have made the minimum expected progress, while those "above" have made more than expected progress.
- 4. 78% for 2025: This is the target. DPS aims to have 78% of students in the "met low" or "above" categories by the end of 2025.

What does this mean for your child?

The school wants to ensure that at least 78% of students from Prep to Year 6 are making expected or better-than-expected progress in their reading skills. This goal helps the school track how well they're supporting students' reading development over time.

Why is this important?

- It shows the school is committed to improving reading skills.
- It provides a clear target for teachers and students to work towards.
- It helps identify students who might need extra support with their reading.

Target 3

By the end of 2025, reduce the number of students (P-3) 'at risk' of not meeting the DIBELS Word Recognition benchmarks by at least 25%.

By the end of 2025, we aim to help more young students (from Prep to Year 3) improve their word recognition skills. Specifically, we want to reduce the number of students who are struggling to meet important reading benchmarks by at least 25%. This means fewer children will be considered "at risk" of falling behind in their early reading development.

Please be respectful of others' privacy by not posting photos on social media without explicit consent. This is especially important if posting photos of other people's children.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION RE ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION TO STUDENTS

<u>Under no circumstances</u> will medication be administered to students unless authority is received from a student's medical practitioner, parent or guardian.

<u>Prescribed medication (short or long term - including antibiotics</u> can only be administered to students when the appropriate form has been completed and signed by the child's medical practitioner, pharmacist or practice nurse.

Non-prescribed medication can only be administered to students when the appropriate form has been completed and signed by the child's parent or guardian.

In all instances, medication must be handed in to the office in the original container, with the chemist's instruction label attached.

Non-prescribed oral medication, such as analgesics (pain killers ie Panadol) and over-the-counter medication cannot be administered by school staff. Fever, headache, earache, toothache etc are considered symptoms of conditions that require further investigation by an appropriate health practitioner.

No medication is to be self-administered including cough mixture, flu tablets and medicated creams/ointments.

All forms authorising administration of medication may be obtained from the school office.

Supporting 5-12 year olds online

Younger children learn to navigate the online world by watching, experimenting and playing online. These tips can help you support them as they develop their skills.

Set clear boundaries

The time your family spends online will depend on your routine. Every family is different, so find what works best for you.

Use devices in shared spaces

When your child is independently online, stay involved by encouraging them to use their device in a shared space, like the kitchen or living room.

Set up profiles

Create separate profiles on shared devices. Use these profiles to customise privacy settings and monitor access to age-appropriate content.

Share online experiences

Talk with your child about what they are doing online and share how you use digital tools in your daily life.



Model consent

Show your child the importance of consent by asking for their permission before sharing photos on your social media.

Think about social media readiness

Most social media platforms require children to be over 13 years old to create an account. When your child is ready, have open conversations about privacy, respectful online behaviours and social media use.

SAFEGUARDING TRAINING IN OUR SCHOOLS

We all have a role to play in keeping children and young people safe.

This year, there is important training that anyone who works with children or young people must complete. This includes all our volunteers and service providers.

The training is compulsory under new laws designed to better safeguard children and young people in Tasmania.

It will help you understand what to do if you believe a child or young person is or may be being harmed, and to make sure you are doing all you can to prevent this from happening. The training will also tell you what you must report under the new laws.

This simple, online training must be done as soon as possible, and you will need to complete it before you work with any children and young people this year.

Once completed, you will receive a certificate. Please ensure that we receive a copy of the certificate as confirmation that you have fulfilled the training requirement.


